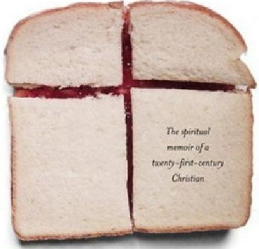
MORE GRADUATE INFORMATION:

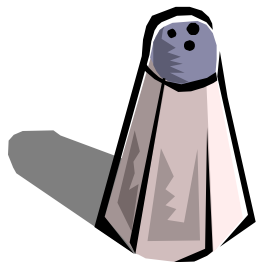

Harry Kreitzer was born just about 4 years ago with major heart issues. He is the son of Sarah Kreitzer, our soprano section leader and song leader at the first service. Since his birth, he has undergone two heart repair procedures in preparation for a third and final one. However, this last procedure cannot be performed – it has been determined that instead, Harry needs a new heart. At this time, his need is under consideration with a team of doctors at Children’s Hospital in Los Angeles.

“Really?” we might say. Just look at that child running around Fellowship Hall, greeting everyone with a big, sticky pat or a strawberry-stained smile, and keeping pace with his big brother Ben. And he does keep right up with him! But, there are more and more incidents that send him to Children’s Hospital, his “Home Away from Home”, to help fight serious infections. He, unfortunately, is a familiar face down there. But he gets the special care needed to bring him home again.

Getting to and from the hospital, spending unknown amounts of time in Los Angeles, and medications have been costly. If he is accepted for the next phase (a heart transplant) there are going to be even more medications, more and lengthier times away from Santa Barbara. After a conversation with Nathan and Sarah, a fund has been set up at Santa Barbara Bank and Trust. It is called “The Harry Kreitzer Heart to Heart Fund” and if you wish to make a love offering/gift to the fund, any one of the local banking offices would help you with the deposit.

FROM EDUCATION to PROCLAMATION!

¹⁴ *But how are they to call on one in whom they have not believed?
And how are they to believe in one of whom they have never heard?
And how are they to hear without someone to proclaim him?*

¹⁷ *So faith comes from what is heard, and what is heard comes
through the Word of Christ.” Romans 10:14,17 (NRSV)*

We were baptized, we worship God on Sunday mornings, we love our coffee fellowship, we even attend education classes ... sometimes ... isn't that what being a Christian is all about?

What does God's calling the disciples to "all the ends of the earth" have to do with us today? God certainly calls people to be pastors, but I'm an electrician, store clerk, physicist, accountant, even a lawyer ... When did God ever call me?

At your baptism! God actually chose you and called you at your baptism to ministry – even if you were only one month old crying at the water splashed on your face!

So...what? What does this mean? What ministry does God call me to in my "normal" life? For Luther, this was a key question he had with the church in Rome while Luther was in the boondocks of Germany in the early 1500's. Rome taught that joining the ministry somehow made popes, priests, monks, and nuns into extra-special people. But Luther countered with Scripture by relying on Paul: through baptism God links us all to Christ's death and resurrection. God drowns us in baptism, and raises up a new person – a child of God, a member of the priesthood of all believers, promised forgiveness forever because of Christ's death for our sins. Baptism is God's great equalizer.

And, Luther continued, relying again on Paul in the Romans quote above, the only way you gain the faith to trust God's promises are For You, to is to hear God's Word proclaimed. You can't create trust, or earn God's promises; God gifts you faith when you hear God's Word, and God gifts you forgiveness through Jesus' death. Now: GO tell someone, so they, too, can be baptized and be given the faith to trust!

Well ...where does God say am I supposed to minister? In Acts 1:8, Jesus tells his disciples before heading up to heaven: "...you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

to us in baptism. Our ministry parallels that of Jesus' disciples: to our own "Jerusalem", "Judea", "Samaria", and finally to the ends the earth:

- ^a To Jerusalem: our home and church. Those places we return to for refueling; our safe havens where a warm snuggle, forgiveness, and reconciliation await.
- ^a To Judea: our areas of work within our community and nation. Judea was the Southern Kingdom, restored as the nation of Israel after suffering in exile; people working together even when conditions were not good.
- ^a To Samaria: to the family members we'd rather forget! Samaria was the remnants of the Northern Kingdom who never did come back from exile. Samaria also never worshiped right according to Judah/Israel, and so were completely shunned. We are called to minister to even those we decide don't live according to our rules!
- ^a To the Ends of the Earth: God's Global Expansion taken to a cosmic order. There is no place God does not want us to take God's promise of forgiveness and reconciliation through Christ in baptism.

We are called to a balance – to minister to those close and far, those we know and those we don't, those we like and those we wish would go away. As Matthew 28 puts it: God says, "GO!" Put others first, and others will put you first. I have your entire life in my hands. Trust me to take care of you, and GO find lots of siblings to join you in heaven!

But sounds wonderful on paper, but HOW do I DO this?

Join us on Sundays in the Chapel between services and find out! That's our exploration: ways we can DO ministry, not just learn about it. From June 22nd through August 31st we are taking time to explore what ministry in the four facets of our lives looks like. There's great discussion, fascinating speakers from TLC's current ministries, hand outs, Power Point, and even clipboards!

But, most of all, there is a spirit of renewal and beginnings sweeping through Trinity, as we anticipate Pastor Trul's arrival. We, and he, are eager to embrace God's Holy Spirit urging us forward into a new era. Come join the adventure!

es in Youth and Family Ministries

Here are two more tips on getting the whole family out the door on Sunday mornings; last month we talked about the importance of preparation and repetition. Here are two for this month:

Plan Ahead: Sunday mornings begin with the plans and intentions of Saturday night. Some families choose clothes the night before for their little ones, or plan a particularly easy breakfast for those late-rising teenagers.

Prioritize: Make Sunday morning in worship the rule, not the exception. Bring friends from a sleepover, wear the soccer uniforms- whatever it takes to show your children that spending time with God is not just something we do when there's nothing else to do.

If you need tips on how to play that out at home, talk to me before or after worship, or even give me a call or an email (kidzndrumz@aol.com) and we'll talk about ways to get that faith journey moving. Here's why it's important:

"I'll bring my children when they're old enough," many parents promise, not quite clear when that age will be. Any age is an appropriate age to join the church, but for parents there may be no age when bringing children to worship is an easy task. But what it comes down to is a pair of rock solid truths: Children Need the Church and the Church Needs Children. I've covered this in detail over the last several months, but here are some special notes for our families with toddlers:

- **Toddlers have a limit to how long they can sit still, wherever you may be. They are too young to pay attention to the entire worship service, and eventually their natural energy will make them want to get up and go. Here are ways to work around that.**
 - Grab one of our Activity Bags, or fill a small bag at home with your child's favorite quiet toys.
 - Sit in the front row or next to the aisle so your child can see all the action and be more fully engaged. Lord knows there's ROOM! We always try to get the best seats in the house for a concert or a sporting event, why should church be any different? Don't worry if you feel watched by many in the congregation: you are. But more often than not they are with fond memories or the sudden realization that we really do have young families in the church. In the nearly six years I've been in youth and family ministry, I have yet to hear a single person complain about kids in church, and you may even be surprised by the folks who notice and offer to help!

Give Your First Aid Kit a Check Up



Tooth loss, Burns, Spider Bites, Bee Stings, Cuts, Nosebleeds, Heatstroke, Sunburn, Animal Bites, and Choking can happen anytime and anywhere. First, have a kit in your car and one at home. Many stores have pre- assembled kits for convenience. Review your First Aid Manual. Let your family members know where the first aid kit it is located. Lastly, check your supplies haven't expired.

Basic supplies

- Adhesive tape
- Aluminum finger splints
- Antibiotic ointment
- Antiseptic solution or towelettes
- Bandages in assorted sizes
- Ace Bandage
- Instant cold packs
- Cotton balls/cotton-tipped swabs
- Telfa pads (good for skin tears)
- Disposable latex or synthetic gloves, at least two pair
- Gauze pads and roller gauze in assorted sizes
- Eye goggles/ eye bandages
- Petroleum jelly or other lubricant
- Plastic bags for the disposal of contaminated materials
- Safety pins in assorted sizes

First Aid Supplies

continued

- Save-A-Tooth storage device containing salt solution and a travel case
- Scissors, tweezers and a needle
- Soap or instant hand sanitizer
- Sterile eyewash, such as a saline solution
- Thermometer
- Triangular bandage
- Turkey baster or other bulb suction device for flushing out wounds
- Sterri-strips



Emergency Items

- First Aid Manual
- Radio
- List of Doctors Names and Phone Numbers
- List of Medications
- Eyeglasses
- Cell Phone Charger
- Flashlight with extra batteries



Medications

- Activated charcoal (use only if instructed by your poison control center)
- Anti-diarrhea medication
- Over-the-counter oral antihistamine (Benadryl, others)
- Aspirin and nonaspirin pain relievers (never give aspirin to children)
- Calamine lotion
- Over-the-counter hydrocortisone cream
- Personal medications
- If prescribed by your doctor, drugs to treat an allergic attack, such as an auto-injector of epinephrine (EpiPen)
- Syringe, medicine cup or spoon

RABBI

This month we will be sitting at the feet of Rabbi Jesus as he is brought to us by Matthew's Gospel. The author used Mark as his foundation text, and presents the story of Jesus as one of hope, to strengthen his readers' faith and stabilize their Christian identity. Ulrich Luz calls Matthew "*the* ethical Gospel."

We will hear the Lord condemn his generation for failing to recognize and receive the Messiah sent to it from God. His contemporaries called John Baptizer demonic because he was an ascetic and mocked Jesus because he was not.

In the typical Jewish manner Jesus addresses in prayer his "Father, Lord of heaven and earth." Father is his favorite way of speaking of God in Matthew. Jesus gives thanks for the divine graciousness to humanity, then addresses us, inviting us to find rest in taking his easy yoke. He calls us to be like him: gentle and humble in heart.

One day Jesus got into a boat and pushed out into the lake of Gennesarat, a storm on which he had previously stilled. He tells a crowd the parable of the sower, whose seeds fall on various types of soil. To this narrative Matthew adds an allegorical interpretation which betrays the hand of the early church in shaping the Jesus tradition.

The Lord offers another parable from his floating pulpit. There's still seed in this one, only it establishes itself well in the soil. However, weeds pop up as well. The field's master decides against pulling up the weeds, lest the wheat be disturbed. Soon enough, the harvest will come; the weeds will be burned while the wheat is gathered into barns. Something like this, says Jesus, is involved with the kingdom of heaven. This parable, like the previous one, comes to us accompanied by allegorical spin.

On July's final Sunday the Rabbi throws a flurry of parabolic images of, or pointers to the divine reign. When God is allowed to rule, he says, when God's rules are followed, it's like a mustard seed that grows a big tree that birds love. Or it's yeast, or buried treasure, or a merchant who buys the perfect pearl, or a fish net.

"Have you understood all this?" the Rabbi will ask us.

Would you agree with the following statement? “Most Americans support actions that reduce abortions, while promoting policies that would prevent unintended pregnancies while (at the same time) assuring adequate health care for women and their children.” This statement, taken from the Jim Wallis book titled The Great Awakening, prompted a surprising discussion, with more than half of our group disagreeing. Their argument, supported by a variety of reasons, came down to a simple conclusion: If Americans really wanted this kind of policy, government action would reflect it.

This is just one example of the many ways our eyes are being opened at the monthly meetings of the Social Justice Discussion and Action Group. If you’d like to take a closer look at interesting issues like this, join us.

On July 27, we will take a different kind of closer look: this time, at poverty and homelessness in Santa Barbara as we work on the serving line at Casa Esperanza. We’ll meet in the Trinity parking lot at 4:45 PM to carpool. After a brief tour of the Casa facility, we will help on the food serving line, and then join the clients at their tables for dinner. Hopefully, we’ll leave with a better appreciation of a group of people that most of us in Santa Barbara rarely meet, and barely understand.

The topic of homelessness in Santa Barbara continues on August 24 at 7:00 PM on the Fireside Room at Trinity when the SJDAG meets to view a video about homelessness in our city. A discussion, led by persons who are working in various ways to help the homeless, will follow. All interested persons are welcome to attend.

Transition House Thanks

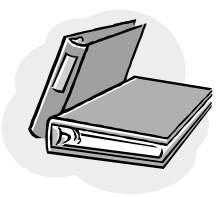
